The bombardier beetle: ingeniously engineered

When the bombardier beetle feels threatened, it sprays a noxious chemical at its assailant. The substance is made by combining a complex mixture of chemicals, causing an explosion that expels a hot, irritating discharge in the direction of the enemy. This complex, integrated and efficient system points to intelligent design.

The giraffe: a unique circulatory system

Because of the great distance between its head and feet (4 to 5 meters, 13-16 feet), the giraffe needs a special blood-pumping system with a succession of valves working together to regulate and equalize the flow of blood to its head. Without this system, excess blood could flow to the brain and damage it when it lowers its head to drink.
